THE CROW COLLECTION OF ASIAN ART ANNOUNCES SEPTEMBER 12, 2015 OPENING OF ALEXANDER GORLIZKI: VARIABLE DIMENSIONS Media preview Thursday, September 10 at 10 a.m.

DALLAS (July 28, 2015) – The Crow Collection of Asian Art presents *Alexander Gorlizki: Variable Dimensions*, a site-specific installation featuring paintings, sculptures, video, and the applied arts—carpets, wallpapers, textiles—for a rich kaleidoscopic experience. The exhibition is on view to the public from September 12, 2015 to March 20, 2016 in the museum's Garden Gallery on level one.

Alexander Gorlizki, born in 1967 and working from studios in Brooklyn, New York, and Jaipur, India, is known primarily for works on paper featuring intricate worlds with quirky characters and pattern-filled abstractions. The exhibition title *Variable Dimensions* refers to an entity without fixed boundaries; it is shifting and open to multiple interpretations. The exhibition itself plays off of this title with works of art as diverse as embroidered handkerchiefs and plant-like hand-mirrors alongside exquisitely crafted paintings with obsessive floral and geometric patterns, most familiar in the Islamic arts.

The exhibition experience begins as you walk through a sculptural gateway designed as an invitation to play—a gateway to a world of imagination. The form of the portal features an arm-like shape, drawing comparisons to a cactus. The wallpaper, made up of repeated simplified forms of circles, rectangles and diamonds, evoking eyes looking back at the viewer, connect in a transcendentally functional way, balancing horizontal and vertical forces, establishing a rhythm in their beats within columns and rows. In the nearby painting *Group Portrait*, a finely painted orange-red Ganesh-headed prince appears straight out of an Indian

miniature with lotus flowers in his crown in the midst of various figures and forms. As you delve into the world of Gorlizki, the eye is drawn to various layers of focal points, imaginative worlds that can be viewed in different and occasionally contrasting terms: Western art and Asian art, the spiritual and the prosaic, cartoon imagery and a rarified, poetic sensibility.

Gorlizki's distinctive works of art are also noted because of his particular artistic method, which utilizes a wide range of artisans and craftspeople specializing in highly skilled, traditional techniques. Originally from the United Kingdom, Gorlizki's connection with Central and South Asian Art, miniature paintings, tantric drawings, textiles, and, broadly, color ranges and pattern, stem from his early travels to Asia with his mother who was shopping for her Asian textile business. Gorlizki states he was "obsessed with Indian miniature paintings" from an early age, so it is no surprise that as he developed his own connections in Central Asia, Northern Pakistan and India, his longest and most fruitful relationship developed with an artist specializing in traditional India miniature paintings in Jaipur, India - Riyaz Uddin.

In *Variable Dimensions*, Gorlizki plays out his obsession by designing works that are often executed, according to his instructions, by Uddin and a small group of assistants at his workshop in Jaipur, India. The works may pass back and forth between New York and Jaipur several times over the course of a few years before Gorlizki deems them complete. In addition to his work with Uddin, Gorlizki has collaborated with artisans including stone carvers, metal casters and weavers, among others, to complete his vision realized in *Variable Dimensions*.
